Dissertation Abstract: My dissertation explores the use of found and appropriated images in documentary by developing the concept of the image-document. Through a series of close readings engaging key terms in documentary studies, *Image-Documents* argues that the incorporation of images not directly produced for a given documentary, such as archival footage and television news reports, is essential to the documentary project. Thus, image-documents are privileged sites for analyzing the formal, epistemological, and political claims of documentary. While often regarded as mere window dressing posturing as definitive evidence, this dissertation conceptualizes image-documents as complex objects that are irreducible to the claims made through them by particular films.
