SUBSIDIES/SUBSIDIZED PROGRAMS

Statewide Child Care Resources

Working Connections Child Care subsidizes family, friend, or neighbor childcare

- o Eligibility requirements
- The child must be a U.S. citizen or legal resident.
- The family must live in Washington state.
- The family's income must be at or below 200 percent of the federal poverty level (FPL) when applying, or 220 percent of FPL when reapplying.
- The parent must be employed or self-employed in legal, income-generating, taxable activities; or the parent must meet all TANF/WorkFirst requirements if participating in that program.

King County Childcare Resources:

Seattle Child Care Assistance Program supports part-time students in postgraduate programs

- o Eligibility requirements
- Be employed and/or enrolled in qualified education or job training program
- Have a child 0-12 years old
- Identify a provider contracted with the City of Seattle
- Meet the income guidelines based on family size
- Demonstrate ineligibility for other childcare subsidy programs

King County Childcare Financial Assistance Program supports King County families with the cost of their childcare. Eligible families may receive financial assistance to pay for their childcare at eligible providers

- o Eligibility requirements
- Live or work in King County
- Have children needing care between the ages of birth to 12 years 11 months, or children between the ages of 13 years to 17 years 11 months who have a disability or special needs
- Have had income, work hours, health and wellbeing, child's health and wellbeing, or access to childcare negatively impacted by COVID-19 in the past year
- Have an income below 80% Area Median Income

❖ Child Care assistance in the cities of Bellevue, Kent, Redmond, and Auburn

- o Eligibility requirements
- Residents of the participating cities: Bellevue, Kent, Redmond, Auburn, or Covington.
- Have child(ren) enrolled in childcare between the ages of 1 month and 12 years.
- Be employed, in job training, or enrolled as a student and attending classes (Bachelor or Associate Degree, or Trade Certificate).
- Not be eligible for or receiving any other childcare subsidy (such as Working Connections WCCC).
- Fall below the following Gross (pre-tax) income guidelines (guidelines change each year).

❖ ECEAP & Head Start

ECEAP (pronounced "E-Cap") is the Early Childhood Education and Assistance Program funded by Washington State for children 3 and 4. **Head Start** is funded by the federal government for children ages 3 and 4 and, in some locations, pregnant women and children birth to age 3.

o ECEAP eligibility

- children must be 3 years old but not yet 5 years old on August 31st of the school year, and:
- On Individualized Education Programs (IEPs) for special education or
- From families at or below 110 percent of the federal poverty level, which includes all children in foster care and all families with Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) cash grants. Some children may be accepted who are over the income limit, if they have developmental or environmental factors.

o Head Start eligibility

- children must be 3 to 5 years old for preschool Head Start; pregnant or 0 to 3 years old for Early Head Start, and:
- From families at or below 130 percent of the federal poverty level, with priority to those at or below 100 percent or
- Homeless, in foster care, or from families with Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) cash grant.
- Some children may be accepted who are over the income limit if they have developmental or environmental factors.

❖ Goodwin Connections is a Seattle-based nonprofit funded by private foundations and donors; it is not like the WA Department of Children Youth and Families, or a city organization, since those are publicly funded. Goodwin fundraises and write grants to support the Family Connections Program, which offers childcare assistance and other benefits to parents enrolled in a full-time degree program.

o Eligibility requirements

- Enrolled full-time in a certificate, associate, or bachelor's degree program at an approved college in King, Pierce, or Snohomish Counties.
- Have residential custody of your child.
- Children must be UNDER 12 years of age.
- Enrolled in a Washington State (Department of Children Youth and Families) licensed childcare facility of your choosing.
- Attend an approved institution in King, Pierce, or Snohomish Counties.
- Reside in King, Pierce, or Snohomish Counties.

- Exceptions will be made on a case-by-case basis for residing in directly neighboring counties. Please see our <u>service area eligibility guidelines here.</u>
- Be enrolled (or planning to enroll) for a full course load of 12 credit hours/units.
- Maintain an overall GPA of 2.5 or greater, each term.
- Be pursuing completion of a certificate, associate, or bachelor's degree.
- We do not fund career change degrees or second degrees and we do not fund post-graduate degrees (doctoral candidates).
- Goodwin reviews master's degree applications on an individual and limited basis.
- Applicants must be eligible for Student Aid and be able to provide a current FAFSA
 (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) or WASFA (Washington Application for
 State Financial Aid).
- Applicants must be able to provide a clear and updated academic/education
 plan that shows which courses are needed to graduate, and the order they will be
 taken (to the best of your knowledge).
- Show a significant financial need for assistance. Goodwin uses 80% of the area median income by county as a guideline. Proof of income, such as recent tax returns, will be required.
- Apply for additional childcare funding you are eligible for. The Family Connections
 Program is intended to be a gap funding source to pay your out-of-pocket costs after
 all other resources (DCYF, CCAMPIS, CCAP, School financial aid, etc) have been
 applied to your childcare invoice. Goodwin requires participants to apply for other
 funding sources they are eligible for.

❖ Veteran Student Childcare Subsidy

- o Eligibility requirements
- Live in King County
- Have served at least one day, as either active duty or a reservist member in any of the armed forces recognized by the United States Department of Defense (any discharge type)
- Be currently and actively enrolled in an accredited post-secondary education program or an accredited employment program such as apprenticeships and journey-level certification programs
- Have children needing childcare between the ages of 0-12
- Fall below 100% of King County Area Median Income

BASIC NEEDS ASSISTANCE

- ORCA LIFT card is our region's reduced-transit fare program. With the ORCA LIFT card, income-qualified riders can save up to 50 percent or more on: Metro Transit buses, Kitsap Transit buses, Sound Transit Link light rail, King County Water Taxi, and the Seattle Streetcar.
- <u>Seattle Public Library System</u> offers 27 locations with computer services, storytime, family events, and of course books and resources galore. The Library system also offers free meals and after-school snacks during the school year and all summer long at select branches to families in need through their <u>Kids Café program</u>.

FAMILY AND CHILD-FOCUSED SUPPORT

 WIC (Women, Infants, and Children Nutrition Program): WIC is a place where families like yours get healthy food and a lot more. WIC helps improve the health of mothers and children through nutrition education, breastfeeding support, healthy food, and health screenings and referrals.

Eligibility requirements:

- Depends on household size and income.
- WIC is a nutrition program for pregnant women, new and breastfeeding moms, and children under five.
- Dad, grandparents, and other caregivers of children under the age of five may also sign kids up for WIC.
- Foster children under age five and foster teens who are pregnant are eligible for WIC.
- If you or your family member are on Medicaid, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), or Basic Food you may be eligible for WIC too.
- Many working families and military families are eligible for WIC.
